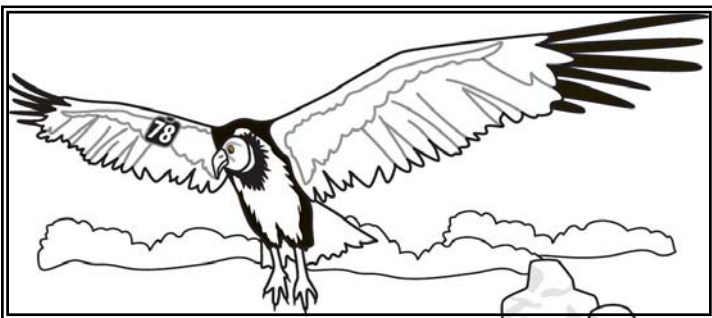


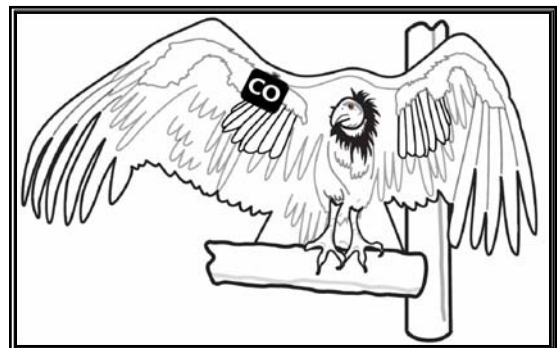

Wear Condor Wing Tags!

Directions

1. Cut the wings tags in to two strips down the middle (long way).
2. Girls select tag 78 and boys select tag CO.
3. Place tag around arm or wrist and tape the two ends together.

Why Condors have Wing Tags

When a condor is in the wild biologists need to know which bird they are looking at. Each bird is given a 3 digit number known as a studbook number. The last two digits of the number are printed on the bird's wing tags.

For example, a wing tag with number 78 could be condor 78, 178, 278, 378, or 478. The female in our Condor Cliffs exhibit is studbook number 378. Only two digits are shown so biologists can see the numbers from a long ways away.

The tags are designed not to hurt the bird or interfere with flying.
