



THE PEREGRINE FUND

The Peregrine Fund, founded in 1970, is the world leader in conserving raptors. Globally engaged across five continents, the Fund leads by example, from foundational science to boots on the ground. Their namesake, the Peregrine Falcon, remains one of few endangered species taken off of the Endangered Species List. This 'business of conservation' model benefits people, natural resources, wildlife, and our future.

The Peregrine Fund's relatively small size attracts the world's top raptor biologists and makes them nimble and highly effective in confronting some of the world's biggest conservation challenges. They lead in science and take direct action to improve populations by working through public-private partnerships, not through litigation.

The Fund wants to work with Congress and the Administration to practice effective, measurable, partner-driven conservation in the philosophies of collaborators like Ducks Unlimited and Wild Sheep Foundation.

The Peregrine Fund has achieved notable successes in various regions, including Utah, Texas, California, Arizona, Puerto Rico, and Hawaii. Some of the significant accomplishments are highlighted below:

Conservation work within the United States:

- Restore the only Critically Endangered bird of prey in North America, the California Condor.
- Restore the only falcon on the Endangered Species List, the Northern Aplomado Falcon.
- Partner with business and industry to address lead poisoning in wildlife.
- Monitor Alaska's raptors.
- Save Puerto Rico's endemic raptors.
- Practical science that guides raptor conservation around the world.
- Training the next generation of conservation leaders.

The Peregrine Fund intends to build stronger partnerships in Congress and the Administration to preserve the beauty of the United States of America for future generations that stands as the gold standard for the world.

- Continued and increased support for recovery programs.
- Creating efficiencies that eliminate wasted resources and red tape.
- Funding for states to develop and maintain education programs that promote effective, common sense conservation.

The Peregrine Fund's accomplishments highlight the effectiveness of their conservation strategies and emphasize the importance of collaboration, innovation, and community involvement.
